

LCDR David Hull

Deputy Director David Hull joined the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps in 1994 and attained the rate of chief petty officer at Marathon Division in Buzzard's Bay, Massachusetts. He stayed in service throughout college, graduate school, and his professional career, holding numerous billets throughout New England. He served as the commanding officer of Freedom Division in Canton, Massachusetts from 2002 through 2005; Freedom was ranked as the top unit in Region 1-1 twice during his command tour, and ranked as the #4 unit in the country in 2003. Hull held various posts on Regional Staff for Region 1-2 from 2005 to 2007 and worked for the NSCC Internet Development Group from 2007 to 2011. In June 2011, he was appointed Regional Director of Region 1-3, covering Vermont, New Hampshire, and northeastern Massachusetts. In June 2016, Hull was hired as the NSCC's Deputy Director, overseeing NSCC operations, training, and policy at Headquarters and in the field.

During his tenure as a volunteer, Hull served on staff at 50 Sea Cadet trainings, including 42 as commanding officer. He created the POLA, JAG, MAA, and EMS trainings that have run at Naval Station Newport since 2002, and ran Recruit Training Command New England, among the largest trainings in the program, for four years.

Hull is a recipient of the Chairman's Medal, the Fred D. Carl Regional Director of the Year Award, 14 Distinguished Service ribbons, ten Meritorious Recognition ribbons, and numerous other NSCC awards.

Hull earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Criminal Justice from Northeastern University, a master's in Education from Boston College, and a law degree from Boston College Law School. Before taking the job at NSCC HQ, he was a professor of criminal justice at Saint Anselm College in Manchester, New Hampshire. He and his wife Stephanie and two daughters live in Virginia.
